- Karen: "Our city commission was in the early stages of researching what recycling services our community wanted. With City Council approval, a recycling survey was just published. Results compiled in January 2025."
- J.B.: "grant was awarded for Arizona to develop a statewide solid waste infrastructure management plan by 2026. It's a best practices document, there are no mandates for communities in the state. Prior plan was developed in 1981. New plan is to push circular economy mentality of reducing waste (in line with National Recycling Strategy).
- "Focusing on first R in Reduce, Reuse and Recycle."
- "One part of the plan is to partner with industry or other entities to turn trash into a resource. He sees that as a missed opportunity in the past."

1. Recycling Program Presentations to Communities

This week J.B. is giving presentation to the City of Page on recycling options, using examples of Bisbee, Patagonia and Pine Top. Each of these small rural communities uses a different fee structure with different services:

- **Bisbee:** recycling fee of \$80+/year is included in overall trash bill for each city resident.
- **Patagonia:** one drive-thru drop-off location with roll-offs provided by Republic Services of Tucson. Open for two hours/week. Donations accepted but not required. The program breaks even with city, business and private funding.
- **Pine Top:** \$2 per bag fee is charged at drop-off location.

2. Analysis Tools

ADEQ partners with Arizona State University and Northern Arizona University on developing recycling best practices. ASU has developed a cost-benefit analysis tool for a community to use to determine the costs required to implement the plan.

Recycling costs ~\$100/ton

VS.

transfer/landfill costs ~\$40-65/ton.

3. Grants and Marketing Information.

ADEQ will be focusing on rural community recycling programs (starting May 2025).
