SonoraFest 2018 will take place inside The Mall at Sierra Vista from 10:00 a.m. to 9:00 p.m. on Saturday, June 16, and from noon to 6:00 p.m. on Sunday, June 17. Held in Bisbee for its inaugural year in 2017, SonoraFest makes its way to Sierra Vista thanks to the Sierra Vista and Tucson Hispanic chambers of commerce, in partnership with the City of Sierra Vista and the State of Sonora, Mexico.

The event will enhance the relationships already being nurtured within the Arizona-Sonora Megaregion, with a focus on commerce and crossborder trade. It also showcases Sierra Vista as a tourist destination and builds upon local economic development efforts that reach into Mexico.

"We're excited to welcome our neighbors from Sonora, as we continue to build relationships with officials and business owners in Mexico," Sierra Vista Mayor Rick Mueller says. "This also provides a unique opportunity for many of the folks on Fort Huachuca who cannot travel across the border to experience some of what Sonora has to offer."

City of Sierra Vista officials and its tourism and economic development staff members are no strangers to Sonora. Just within the last year, they have made numerous trips to conferences, town halls, and other events across the border. This is helping the City grow relationships, engage with business owners considering a presence in the U.S., and expand marketing efforts encouraging Sonorans to shop, stay, and recreate in Sierra Vista.

Starting at 10:00 a.m. on Saturday, June 16, the schedule for SonoraFest includes the singing of the Mexican and United States national anthems by area children's choruses. Then officials from both sides of the border will share remarks and participate in a grand opening and ribbon cutting. Performances, vendors, food trucks, and around the clock entertainment will continue throughout the event.

# **Use Common Sense This Fire Season**

This year is no different, and I urge residents to exercise additional care until the monsoon rains arrive and conditions improve. That means paying attention to the weather forecast and avoiding any activities that could spark a fire, especially on windy days. It's just common sense but even a small lapse in judgment could put your friends and neighbors at risk.

The high fire danger already caused Sierra Vista Fire & Medical Services to suspend the issuance of open burn permits and has resulted in strict fire restrictions on all state and federal land in southeastern Arizona, including national parks and public campgrounds. Prohibited activities include campfires, grilling, shooting firearms, driving motorized vehicles off approved roadways, smoking outdoors, and use of combustion engine powered tools/equipment.

Camping without a campfire may dampen the fun but starting one is not worth risking the consequences. Violating fire restrictions can result in steep fines, possible imprisonment, and personal responsibility to reimburse fire suppression costs. And no one wants to be responsible for the loss of local homes or businesses due to a wildfire.

Fireworks are also prohibited on federal lands and their use is strictly regulated in the City of Sierra Vista. You can learn more about local fireworks restrictions on page 4, and I urge residents to be careful when celebrating our nation's independence on the Fourth of July.

Fortunately, thanks to the Sierra Vista Rotary Club and generous donations from the local community and businesses, Sierra Vista hosts a spectacular fireworks display for everyone to enjoy. I recommend residents come out to watch the show instead of setting off their own fireworks.



## As Economy Rebounds, City Budget Remains Tight

Even before the impacts of a statewide recession were being felt here in Sierra Vista, the City began preparing for lean budget years. Since then, through attrition, we've reduced the City's workforce by about a fifth, merged some departments, and are still constantly exploring ways to operate more efficiently. At the same time, we've took a lead in local economic development efforts and invested strategically to support the community.

Fortunately we're seeing an increase in local sales tax revenues and building permit activity. The local housing market is also improving, with fewer foreclosures and increasing home values. As Cochise College Center for Economic Research Chief Economist Robert Carreira shared during this year's economic outlook luncheon, it appears Sierra Vista and Cochise County are climbing out of the recession.

That's excellent news for our community and helps support the City's budget. However, we face other external pressures and circumstances that make this year's budget process a challenging one.

Like other cities throughout the state, Sierra Vista faces increasing expenses tied to the Public Safety Personnel Retirement System. This is largely due to issues that can only be solved at the state level, as the fund has had a history of investments

that did not pan out and structural problems that have hampered its recovery. This year, we face an added expense of more than \$400,000 in our PSPRS contribution.

Another factor that limits our revenues to support the budget is the high rate of population growth in other parts of Arizona, especially Maricopa County. Since we have not grown as quickly, Sierra Vista will receive a smaller share of state shared revenues, an area which would have otherwise seen growth.

What makes this budget year particularly challenging is the fact we've already been making cuts, improving efficiencies, and holding off on major capital expenditures for nearly a decade. Some capital priorities may simply not be able to wait any longer. Top priorities include new radios for Sierra Vista Fire & Medical Services and a new server structure.

Just as in years past, I'm confident our City Council will make the tough decisions necessary to pass a budget that meets our community's needs.

I encourage citizens to track the budget process as we prepare for budget work sessions the week of June 11. The City Council will then adopt a tentative budget, capping amount we can spend, on June 28, before voting on the final budget and holding a property tax hearing on July 26.

## **Saving Energy Helps Control Costs**

Sometimes doing the right thing for the environment also means doing the right thing for the City's bottom line.

That's the case with ongoing energy conservation efforts that help to chip away at the City's approximately \$1 million annual electricity bill. The rates for electricity are only trending upward, so reducing consumption and exploring alternative energy is vital to minimize its impact on the budget. It's also a priority within the City Council's Strategic Plan as part of its focus on environmental leadership.

Of that \$1 million bill, City buildings account for the 33 percent of the energy consumption, the Environmental Operations Park makes up 22 percent, and the sports fields use 13 percent. Those are the three largest energy consumers in the City and staff is working to address all three.

"We're always looking for ways to operate more efficiently and cost-effectively. Saving money where we can helps the City adapt to budgetary pressures in other areas and ensures that we make the most of taxpayer dollars," City Manager Chuck Potucek says.

In recent years, the City's Public Works
Department has been conducting an LED
conversion program to switch out less energy
efficient lights at facilities throughout the
City. To date the program has resulted in
the conversion of 90 percent of the lights
at The Cove, all the lights in parks buildings,

40 percent of the lights at Fire Station 1, 30 percent of the lights at the police department, and most of the parking lot lights at Cityowned facilities.

The Leisure and Library Services Department is seeking grant opportunities to expand that LED conversion program to include lights at City sports fields. Converting those lights to LEDs could reduce their energy consumption by up to 60 percent. This could help the City keep user fees for these facilities low as well.

The Public Works Department has also recently upgraded an old heating and cooling control system to enable staff to monitor and control the air conditioning, heating, and ventilation of City buildings from anywhere at any time. The implementation of a new energy management system is currently in progress and will automatically control heating, cooling, lighting, and security systems at all major City buildings to help save energy, while ensuring working environments stay comfortable.

Finally, the City received a grant from the Water Infrastructure Finance Authority to conduct an energy study of the Environmental Operations Park, the City's wastewater treatment facility. That study includes a feasibility evaluation of using solar energy to power the facility.



## School Zone Beacons Improve Safety on Avenida del Sol

New school zone beacons will go into effect on Avenida del Sol on either side of the crosswalk located at Paseo Las Palmas for next school year, improving safety for students and families crossing the street to attend Pueblo del Sol Elementary School.

These beacons were recommended by the City's traffic safety committee to help deter speeders when the school zone is in effect. They are an improvement over the rolling school zone signs manually put in place each school day.

The beacons will be programmed to flash when the school zone is active before and after school each day. They will not be active on days school is not in session. When the lights are flashing, the 15 mph speed limit is in effect between the beacons.

The City will activate the beacons on Monday and Tuesday July 30 and July 31 as a final test and notice prior to the first day of school on Wednesday, August 1.

Since Avenida del Sol is four lanes, motorists are also urged to heed a state law prohibiting passing in a school zone. The law prohibits passing another vehicle traveling the same direction inside a school zone even if that vehicle is in a separate lane.

The beacons are also completely solar powered. This saves the City money by not adding to its electricity costs and also by reducing the amount of work and equipment needed to complete the project.

## **PUBLIC SAFETY**





As Sierra Vista residents prepare to celebrate Independence Day, they should be aware that the use of fireworks in the City limits is strictly regulated and only certain types of consumer fireworks are legal in Arizona.

In light of dry conditions and the potential for high winds at this time of year, it's especially important to take common-sense precautions and know the law so a well-intentioned celebration does not spark a dangerous fire.

"Many fireworks are still illegal in Arizona, including anything designed to become airborne and explode," Sierra Vista Fire Marshal Paul Cimino says.

Bottle rockets, sky rockets, roman candles, helicopters, and jumping jacks are common examples of fireworks that remain illegal statewide. Permitted fireworks include cylindrical and cone fountains, ground spinners, illuminating torches, and other types designed to be handheld or to remain on the ground.

"When an emergency response is required due to improper use of fireworks, the person responsible may be liable to pay for it," Sierra Vista Police Department Public Information Officer Cpl. Tim Wachtel says. "Even legal fireworks can only be used in certain locations within the City limits."

In Sierra Vista fireworks can only be used on private property, with the permission of the property owner. That means any public areas, to include parks, schools, streets, and public right-of-ways, are off limits for fireworks. It's also illegal for anyone under 16 to purchase fireworks and for anyone under 18 to use them unless supervised by an adult.

# EVEN SMALL FIREWORKS CAN CAUSE INJURIES

Fire danger is not the only risk. There were an estimated 11,900 fireworks-related injuries treated in U.S hospitals in 2015, according to an annual report by the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission.

That's the highest total in the 15 years recorded in the report and about 67 percent of those injuries occurred in a one month period between June 19 and July 19. Sparklers actually caused the most injuries, sending about 1,900 people to the emergency room during that month alone.

"Even small fireworks used in a lawful manner can be dangerous, both due to the threat of fire and the risk of injury. So please be careful. The last thing we want to see is someone putting themselves or the community at risk by making a careless decision," Cimino says.



# Protect Your Pets on the Fourth of July

While Independence Day promises plenty of family-friendly fun, the combination of extreme heat, large crowds, and loud noises can make it frightening and even dangerous for the furry members of the family.

The most common risk is the potential for fireworks to spook pets, especially dogs, into running away and getting lost. With one of the largest fireworks shows in the state, Sierra Vista will offer a spectacular display in the Domingo Paiz and Stone Fields just after 8:00 p.m. on July 4. That's a great time to ensure pets are safe and secure at home.

"Each year, animal shelters across the country receive lost dogs that get spooked by fireworks displays during the Fourth of July," says Arleen Garcia, the City's animal control supervisor. "It's a good time to make sure all your pets are properly tagged or microchipped, so if they do get lost they can be easily identified and quickly returned."

Leaving pets outside unsheltered is also dangerous due to the extreme heat experienced during the day. And hot cars are the last place for a pet, as the temperature can reach levels that cause brain damage or even death in a matter of minutes on hot days.

It's also important not to leave dogs outside unattended during the fireworks show, even in a fenced yard or on a chain. The loud noises may make them panic and cause them to try to escape the yard or become entangled in their chain.

## BE A LOCAL TOURIST




One night each month, the Huachuca Astronomy Club invites the public inside Patterson Observatory to peer through its 20-inch Patterson Telescope and explore the universe. Now, thanks to some recent improvements, the experience is truly out of this world!

Club members recently donated two 8-inch telescopes to complement the observatory's giant telescope. One of those scopes is outfitted with a sophisticated video camera, which enables those waiting for their turn at the eyepiece to see what the scopes are viewing displayed live on a wide screen TV.

And that's not all. Thanks to a recent grant from the Southern Arizona Rural Activation and Innovation Network, made possible by the National Science Foundation, the club has transformed the observatory's central bay into a mini-science center. Current displays focus on exploring Mars and women in Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math fields.

The displays are teeming with cool stuff like a Space Shuttle tile on loan from NASA, an iron meteorite shared by a local astronomy club member, and meteorite kits provided by the Planetary Science Institute. Other artifacts are on their way, including a piece of rock containing a telltale layer of iridium that is evidence of the meteorite that led to the extinction of the dinosaurs.

The observatory building is also being expanded to include restrooms, a break room, and storage. Plus a new project will add a state of the art conference and teaching center to the existing classroom in the coming months.



## IF YOU GO

Free Public Nights at Patterson Observatory are held once a month on the Thursday nearest the first quarter moon.

The next public night is set for Thursday, June 14, from 8:00 to 9:30 p.m. Then the public nights will go on hiatus in July and August, before returning on Thursday, September 13, at 7:00 p.m. Other upcoming dates include October 11 at 6:30 p.m., November 15 at 6:00 p.m., and December 13 at 6:00 p.m.

The observatory is located on the University of Arizona Sierra Vista campus at 1140 N. Colombo Avenue. It is available by appointment to schools and youth groups free of charge.

The University of Arizona South Foundation also offers a field trip grant program to help schools and classrooms pay for transportation and food to visit the Patterson Observatory and adjacent Discovery Gardens. 




