We are welcoming 16 high school students from one of our Sister Cities (Radebeul, Germany) from 6-27 April, 2023. We would like to ask the Mayor and any Council Members to provide a short welcome prior at the Hauser Museum and would like to ask when you would be most easily available. We are asking that this happens at your convenience during the week of 10-14 April.

Overview of the Sister Cities Association of Sierra Vista:

The Sierra Vista Sister Cities Association works for the Sierra Vista City Council with the intent of creating and promoting cultural and humanitarian partnerships with international communities. To achieve this goal, we partnered with Cananea, Mexico in 1989, and Radebeul, Germany in 1998 to conduct cultural, educational, and goodwill exchange programs. Each year we focus our efforts around three main pillars: the conduct of high school student exchanges, humanitarian outreach, and the celebration of cultural diversity.

Our high school student exchanges form the centerpiece of our program, which is a cultural exchange and not simply a series of international vacations. Each Fall we enable eight local youth to join eight others from Cananea on an exchange for two weeks as student diplomats to experience daily life in Germany. They are hosted by German families; visit local high schools, local and state government offices, factories, and make day trips to neighboring Prague and historic Berlin.

In return, our students host German students for a week and a half in the Spring as they tour southern Arizona. We have been able to chaperone trips to Ft Huachuca (museums, B-Troop, and German Liaison Office) and Davis-Monthan Airbase (toured the flight line and sat in A-10 aircraft), the state capital and museum, the University of Arizona, the Grand Canyon, San Xavier Mission, the Arizona Desert Museum, and local attractions such as Buena High School, Tombstone, Bisbee, Coronado Cave, and Brown Canyon Ranch. Finally, the German students travel to Cananea for a week and stay with the families of students they hosted in Germany the previous Spring.

To make this possible we coordinate between the City and the local school board, as well as their counterparts in Cananea and Radebeul. We help match students with host families and manage chaperones (each able to speak at least two languages). We also provide for transportation within Germany, health insurance while there, and this year started to provide scholarships for deserving students who couldn't afford the trip.

The cost to the Commission for the exchange is usually around \$5000 per year, and the families only must provide a portion of the airfare for their child (this year \$342). We do ask that the students fill out a questionnaire and write an essay explaining why they should be chosen to attend the exchange, as well as what they hope to learn from the experience. Students must attend regular meetings at the high school and must help with fund raising events that help their trip and their hosting experience. Finally, we require those that go on the trip to create and give a presentation to the local school board and to the city council.

The second pillar of our program is humanitarian outreach to our Sister City in Cananea. To that end we and the students in our program have collected medical supplies (canes, crutches, wheelchairs, etc.), jackets, back packs, school supplies, and even heaters for classrooms in Cananea. This is ongoing and is often the result of targets of opportunity.

The third pillar is our support for and celebration of cultural diversity at all levels. We provide a constant presence at events such as Christmas Around the World, the West End Fair, the Cultural Heritage Celebration (Diversity Fair), and the annual Oktoberfest celebration, at which students are required to attend and represent both themselves and our organizations. This year we were able to partner with Cochise College to provide a day-long cultural immersion trip to Cananea, which included five students from Cochise College, five students from Buena High School, and several adults who carpooled behind the city van. They toured the copper mine, ate at a local restaurant, visited City Hall, and spent some time shopping.

We know that we make a difference for a small group of students each year. The relationships created by mutual hosting continue long after the year is over (each student who goes on the exchange must host that family's child in return). At the end of each segment of the exchange we have family events, and here in Sierra Vista we have students and families from all three countries attend a potluck and formal goodbye. It is a truly emotional event indeed.

Our students also experience global citizenship at a particularly personal level. Our Mexican and European sister cities are no longer faceless abstractions that they hear about on the evening news. Instead, they become less and less an expression of "them", and more of an expression of "us." When the students begin to say "we" without hesitation, it is our turn to get emotional. In the end, that is what motivates us.

AGREEMENT BETWEEN SISTER CITIES ASSOCIATION AND THE CITY OF SIERRA VISTA

The Sister Cities Association (SCA) and the City of Sierra Vista (City) agree to work together in good faith to provide services and opportunities in support of the City of Sierra Vista's Sister Cities mission.

A copy of the approved Resolution between Sister Cities International and the City of Sierra Vista shall be provided to the SCA for their records.

Whereas, the SCA share goals of international cooperation, mutual prosperity, and world peace with its sister cities located at Cananea, Mexico and Radebeul, Germany; and

Whereas, the City believes it to be a matter of public benefit to support the mission of SCA; and

Whereas, they place similar values on cultural understanding, youth leadership, exchanges to educate citizens, etc.; and

Whereas, the City is committed to supporting the goals and mission of the SCA, namely: cultural exchanges, youth leadership, educational opportunities, etc.; and;

Now, Therefore, We, the Mayor of the City of Sierra Vista and the Chairman of the Board of Directors of the SCA, do believe that this agreement will further contribute to the cause of world peace and to the development of friendly relations between the peoples of Mexico, Germany and the United States; and

NOW THEREFORE, the City of Sierra Vista Agrees to the following:

- A. The City will provide partnership amenities and services to the SCA to include, but not limited to:
 - 1) Staff Support
 - 2) City Facilities
 - 3) Vehicles
 - 4) Fuel
 - 5) Drivers (if CDL required)
 - 6) Food Trailer
 - 7) Sister Cities International Annual Fee for the SCA
- B. The City will provide resources and services to the SCA in order to support the SCA's commitment to accomplish the goals and objectives as it directly relates to the City's established Sister Cities (Cananea, Mexico and Radebeul, Germany), subject to availability. Should the City deny a request for such services or resources, a reason for the denial will be provided to the SCA in writing.

- C. The City authorizes its Director of Leisure and Library Services, or his/her designee, to represent the organization in the oversight, negotiation, and implementation of this agreement to include approvals, fee waivers, support, and the resolution of conflicts and situations not specifically identified in this agreement.
- D. The Mayor's Office will provide policy, mission direction, and decisions regarding the Sierra Vista Sister Cities program to the SCA as needed.
- E. The City agrees to reimburse the SCA for student exchange insurance for approved student exchanges, up to \$1,000.00 per fiscal year. Policies are available through Sister Cities Travel Insurance:

NOW THEREFORE, the Sister Cities Association Agrees to the following:

- A. The SCA agrees to conduct the City's Sister city Activities, which include the annual student exchange, participation in the Arizona Sister cities organization, liaison with counterparts in Radebeul and Cananea, and any other activities which are concomitant to full participation as a Sister City, subject to financial and personnel constraints within the SCA.
- B. The SCA is responsible for procuring its own liability insurance (General Liability, Directors and Officers, and Workers Compensation, as applicable) with respect to its activities under this Agreement, and shall indemnify the City against and hold the City harmless from any and all claims, including attorneys fees, arising out of the SCA's activities under this Agreement, unless such activities are undertaken as a direct result of or in conjunction with the City as part of an official City function or "event".
- C. Requests by the SCA for City amenities and services shall be made in writing to the Leisure Division Manager for consideration and approval by the Leisure and Library Services Director. Requests should be made as early as possible to avoid conflicts but no less than two weeks in advance.
- D. SCA members who wish to drive City vehicles must have an approved, completed City of Sierra Vista volunteer application on file with the Department of Leisure and Library Services.
- E. SCA authorizes its Board of Directors, or its designee, to represent the organization in the oversight, negotiation, and implementation of this agreement, to include resolution of issues not specifically identified in this agreement.

NOW THEREFORE, both parties agree to the following:

A. Neither party shall conduct negotiations or conclude agreements with any other entity regarding the Sister Cities program without the full participation and consent of the other party.

B. Both parties agree to provide the other a list of their key personnel and to advise the other regarding changes to personnel on a regular basis.

This agreement shall take effect on the date it is entered into below. It shall remain in effect in perpetuity unless bilaterally amended, terminated by either party by giving the other a minimum of 30 calendar days' notice, or superseded by a future agreement.

MISCELLANEOUS TERMS

- 1. It is mutually agreed upon and understood by and among the Parties of this Agreement that:
 - In no way does this Agreement restrict the Parties from participating in similar agreements with other public or private agencies, organizations, and individuals.
 - b. Except as otherwise provided for herein, nothing in this Agreement shall obligate either Party to the transfer of funds. Any endeavor involving reimbursement or contribution of funds between the Parties will be handled in accordance with applicable laws, regulations, and procedures. Such endeavors will be outlined in separate agreements that shall be made in writing by representatives of the Parties involved and shall be independently authorized by appropriate statutory authority. This Agreement does not provide such authority.
 - c. This Agreement is not intended to and does not create any right, benefit, or trust responsibility.
 - d. This Agreement will be effective upon the signature of both Parties.



Berlin Pt. 2






